






Kindergarten

Second Grade




Third and Fourth Grade

Basketball


The elementary boys' basketball season begins Thursday, October 4! Due to a lack of numbers, we are now sending all of our sports' teams (except Track) down to Edgeley.



But, I did manage to find my way and then the challenge was figuring out when I was supposed to be where I was supposed to be. For those first few weeks, most of us freshmen at NDSU were walking around with a schedule in our hands.

Part of my issue with going to JHS and then NDSU was that I had up to that point attended a school very much like Montpelier School. Through grades K-8, I had only had 5 different teachers. Then, in grades 7-8 there was only one teacher. Once I was in the 9th grade, I went from class to class and that was a big change. But in Pingree High School, there is only one hall which contained all our classes. It was a big change to go to JHS my 11th grade year and then NDSU. I can say that I was certainly not prepared. Academics were certainly not the problem. The problem was keeping track of myself.

Statistics change all the time, but I do know that when I started NDSU we were told to look around at those freshmen around us. Half of us, we were told, would not be there the next year. And $\frac{3}{4}$ would be gone by the time we graduated. That was sobering news, but the problem, we were told, was not academics but rather self-discipline. For the first time in most of our lives we were responsible for being where we were supposed to be when we were supposed to be there. And most kids going into college simply weren't prepared for that.


When we were talking about switching to the flex mod schedule which we now have, I will admit to a bit of trepidation. But one thing I saw last year was that because our school is so small and we know each of our kids so well, we end up doing everything for them. I'm more guilty of that than any teachers. If somebody has a question, I love to answer it. Last year, at any given time of the day I usually knew where every single kid was supposed to be in grades 7-12. And they knew that, too. Sometimes kids weren't where they were supposed to be, but part of that was because the responsibility of knowing was shifted from them to us. Regardless of how the kids felt, it was my responsibility to be sure they were where they were supposed to be.

Now, that's different. Now, the person that knows best where each student is supposed to be is that student. We did NWEA testing this fall for grades 7-12. Initially when students finished, I would pull up their schedule and tell them exactly where they were supposed to go. As one was leaving one day, however, I wasn't at the right screen in PowerSchool and she said, "That's okay. I will just look at my schedule." And after that I just told students, "Go to where you need to be at 2" or whatever time it might be and nobody questioned it. Everybody went to where they supposed to be.

That, all by itself, is success. Teachers do have an added responsibility now of making sure that each student is in the correct place at the correct time. And there have been a few instances of students not being where they were supposed to be but what's interesting is that most of those times those students had taken it upon themselves to go where they needed extra help at those times. Perhaps they needed math help so they just went to Mrs. Miller. Or perhaps they needed social studies help so they went to Ms. Leggate. And then they are told that they should have told the teacher of the resource time they were assigned where they were going, but I am more than happy to see them taking responsibility for themselves.


